Duties and Responsibilities

Head Teamster:

The Head Teamster is responsible for the Wagons and Teams Duties:

- 1. Supervision and coordination of all teamsters
- 2. Work closely with teamsters in preparation for the Tune Up and Main Trek
- 3. Coordinate feed, water, and veterinary supplies with Wrangler and Head of Support
- 4. Assist teamsters in preparation of all wagons for Tune Up and Main Trek
- 5. Aid the Head of Support in the coordination and organization of all motorized vehicles needed to transport teams and wagons
- 6. Plan and coordinate a retrieval process in the event of a breakdown with Head of Support
- 7. Coordinate return transportation for wagons and teams upon conclusion of the trek in conjunction with the Head of Support, as needed
- 8. Obtain confirmation of insurance releases for teams and wagons, as needed
- 9. Coordinate with the Wagon Train Executive committee.

Teamster:

The Teamster...

- 1. Is the person in charge of a team¹ and wagon or cart.
- 2. Recruits a swamper² before Tune-up trek to assist them during the Wagon Train Treks
- 3. Shall be able to control their team at all times
- 4. Shall be in control of the wagon³ whenever it is hooked to a team
- 5. Will be on the box (front seat) the majority of the trek
- 6. Should work with youth and adults in a safe, respectful, and positive manner
- 7. Will adhere to the 4-H Wagon Train "Code of Conduct" and "Articles of Organization"⁴
- 8. If the teamster determines that another person is experienced enough to handle the team, they may invite that adult or youth to be a "Guest Driver"⁵.
 - a. It is expected that any Guest Driver have sufficient experience to control the team. The Teamster is responsible for making this assessment.
 - b. Should be limited to when the Teamster determines the team is relaxed and the driving conditions are suitable for the Guest Driver's ability.
 - c. The teamster should be in the wagon but not necessarily on the box (front seat).
 - d. If the Guest Driver is a Youth; see "Youth Swamper/Guest Driver" section

² A swamper is an assistant to a Teamster. See "Swamper" section for specific duties.

³ Wagon is identified as any vehicle pulled by an individual or team of equines.

SWAMPER:

The Swamper is a required assistant to the Teamster and should meet the following guidelines. The Swamper...

- 1. Is expected to have hands-on experience with the team prior to the Tune-Up Trek
- 2. Must be able to control the team at any time during the trek
- 3. Should be able to enter and exit the wagon safely and efficiently
- 4. Should be able to harness, hitch, groom, feed, and water the team
- 5. In the unforeseen absence of the Teamster, must be able to drive and control the team until the return or replacement of the Teamster
- 6. Is expected to be a Guest Driver during the trek
- 7. Should be able to work with youth and adults in a safe, respectful, and positive manner
- 8. Will adhere to the "Code of Conduct" and "Articles of Organization" of 4-H Wagon Train
- 9. Youth Swampers must be at least 14 years of age and approved by Teamster Committee⁶

Youth Swamper/Guest Driver:

- 1. The teamster must be confident in the youth's ability to control the team.
- 2. It is assumed that the teamster will be on the box with the youth Guest Driver at all times.
- 3. Any variation to the above requirements for youth guest drivers must be approved by a teamster committee prior to Tune Up.
- 4. Youth Swampers must be able to meet all Swamper expectations
- 5. Youth Swampers must be at least 14 years of age and approved by Teamster Committee⁷
